From the President

You may recall that in the last edition of this newsletter I brought to your attention the Warriewood Valley Strategic Review. Of concern to us was a proposal for the "redevelopment" of the Nelson Heather Centre. You also may have read in the Manly Daily that the review has been 'shelved'. However, our enquiries of Council staff and the Council's website indicate that staff will present to Council their recommendations in the wake of the recent local government elections.



On August 12, we held our annual Charity Pairs. My thanks go to the many members who supported the day. Special congratulations to Sue Riley (pictured with Ken Hughes of the Rural Fire Service) on a very successful event. This year, the Club raised nearly \$8,000 to be provided to our nominated organisations. More on this elsewhere in the newsletter.

We have spent the last few months consolidating the bridge education of our 2012 beginners. This is a sizeable contingent numbering over 50 people. Our education team is running **Practice Play Sessions** on Tuesday afternoons (big thanks to Jo Jarvis), Friday mornings (thanks to Terry & Lois Rothwell) and Monday nights (thanks to Kelly Barber). In addition, we are featuring **Improvers Workshops** with Cath Whiddon on the 1st Wednesday morning and 3rd Monday night of the month. New beginner classes (Day & Evening) start up again in October and we hope members will encourage friends and neighbours to try the "best mind game in the world". In June, we also subsidised a professional workshop with David Beauchamp on expert defence - 48 of our members attended. This provides our volunteer dealers with much greater flexibility in when they can deal our session boards. Previously, the location of the dealing machine did not allow our dealers to produce boards at the same time as duplicate sessions were in progress. A round of applause for Jim Fairley and his crew who put in a great deal of hard work to get this done.

Finally, my thanks to Michael Hanvey who has done an excellent job producing this newsletter for the past several years.

The Bidding:

West has a real problem over 2S. A double in this situation would be for penalty and not negative. 4NT would be interpreted as Blackwood agreeing hearts. Any bid could be wrong so West opts for 5D. North has no trouble sacrificing in 5S which is doubled by West.

Suggested Play:

West leads the AD. The defence must win a diamond, 2 hearts and a club for + 300. E/W can make 5D for + 600 (hard to avoid losing 2 clubs) so N/S did very well.

Tip: There are times where we have to make an intelligent guess as to which bid to make.

The Bidding:

With only 5 losers West has no problem bidding 4H.

Suggested Play:

South wins the first diamond trick with the KD. If North has the QD it is safe to continue diamonds. As this is uncertain, South must switch to a spade at trick 2. Now the defence takes a spade, 2 diamonds and a club. Had South cashed the AD at trick 2 West should discard dummy's spade loser on the QD.
